A snapshot of how the funds were spent

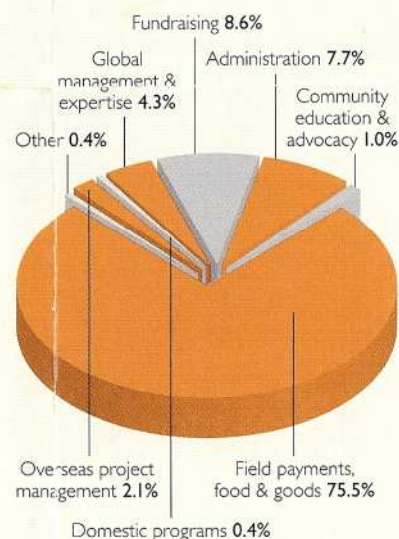

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Myanmar: Smiles piglet brings home rice, potatoes and a brighter future

Ensuring that children and families have access to the nutritious food they need to live healthy and productive lives is a fundamental goal of many of our community development programs.
